

Dear Parishioners and Friends of Sacred Heart,

Today's readings begin with a healing of body and end with lasting cure for the whole person, outside and inside. In the gospel, ten lepers were healed, but only the Samaritan underwent far beyond physical remedy of his skin ... to a true, interior, enduring cure of his personal dignity, his interpersonal relationships in society, and ultimately his spiritual well-being (i.e., salvation). The difference for him, as for Naaman in the first reading, was their faith-filled gratitude to the God who had healed them.

Living gratitude, or being thank-full, enriches us, often in subtle and unexpected ways. We become enlivened – physically, emotionally, and spiritually. Living genuine gratitude changes us for the better. Thankfulness allows fresh blood flowing in & out of our heart easier, frees us from unnecessary sufferings (i.e., self-pity, isolation, bitterness), brightens our views on life, strengthens our bonds with God and all creatures, etc. In short, living faith-filled gratitude, we discover joy and gain happiness, both short-term (healthy body, mind, spirit) and long-term (salvation).

From a life of any Saint or mature/healthy soul, we see a simple heart that kindly, unwearyingly practices faith-filled gratitude. In this month of the ROSARY, may we practice gratitude with the Blessed Virgin Mary through simple gestures, such as offering grace before meals, praying the rosary as a family, forgiving oneself and those who hurt us, caring for aging parents, and acting of God's behalf to extend genuine kindness to the poor and the vulnerable. Most importantly, prepare for and participate at Mass, for the Eucharist (in Greek) literally means "thanksgiving." Thank God for the gift of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist, and among us.

As I write this note, I am mindful of so many kind, generous hearts here at Sacred Heart, including my Redemptorist confreres, parish staff, volunteers in various ministries, homebound folks, etc. Thank God for each and all of you. And thank you. Though I don't say often enough, I do love you very much!
