COMMITTEE TO END HOMELESSNESS TEN-YEAR PLAN

The Committee to End Homelessness is conducting a Mid Plan Review of the Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness in King County, and will host a series of open meetings to gather input on which key policy questions are most important to answer for the second half of the Ten-Year Plan. In 2005, our region embraced a Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness and established the Committee to End Homelessness in King County (CEH), charged with implementing the goals of the Ten-Year Plan: prevent homelessness whenever possible; move people rapidly from homelessness to stable housing; increase the efficiency of existing systems and improve collaboration; and create the public and political will to end homelessness. Now, in year five of the Ten-Year Plan, CEH is conducting a mid-plan review. It will look at the original goals, accomplishments to date, external forces affecting implementation of the plan, including (and especially) changes

in the economy and the emerging federal and state priorities relating to housing and homelessness. Most important, the mid-point review will develop recommendations for what we need to do going forward, as a region, to achieve the goal of ending homelessness, with a particular focus on what we need to be doing differently.

The Mid Plan Review will be a thorough process, meant to engage people in critical thinking to help refocus the community's efforts in the most meaningful way in the last five years of the Ten-Year Plan. It accepts that the original goals and objectives may need to change, that the priorities may need reordering, that resources may need realignment, and that partners' and players' roles may need to change.

Join us for an evening discussion about the future of Smith Cove and the potential for a new shoreline park in your community.

The Port of Seattle and the City of Seattle are discussing a possible land exchange and creation of a new waterfront park in the Smith Cove area. Those discussions could result in a relocated

city park and playfield with expanded shoreline access. The King County Wastewater Treatment Division also has proposed construction of an underground Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) holding tank in the area to protect water quality in Puget Sound. This is a unique opportunity to help plan recreation uses, shoreline habitat and potential new public access to the water. Plan to attend and bring your ideas to create a new Smith Cove Park.

CONSTRUCTION ALONG DEXTER AVENUE N



The Seattle Department of Transportation (SDOT) will begin repaving Dexter Avenue N the second week in March. This project is funded by the “Bridging the Gap” transportation levy approved by Seattle voters in November 2006.

Project Location

Dexter Avenue N from Fourth Avenue N to Roy Street

Project Description

In addition to the repaving, the project will:

- Install a buffered bike lane on each side of the street
- Remove the two-way left turn lane
- Provide dedicated left-turn lanes at busy intersections
- Provide in-lane bus stops to improve transit speed and reliability
- Install dedicated bus islands
- Install street lighting upgrades (by City Light crews)
- Construct sidewalk improvements
- Install new drainage detention pipes

Project Schedule

Construction work is scheduled to begin in March 2011 and continue through October 2011 in three phases lasting 2-3 months each. Final paving will be completed in each phase before construction moves to the next phase.

Phase 1 – Fourth Avenue N to McGraw Street

Phase 2 – McGraw Street to Garfield Street

Phase 3 – Garfield Street to Roy Street

- Construct sidewalk improvements
- Install new drainage detention pipes
