City Data Open to the Public

Sixty city of Seattle datasets are now accessible online at <u>http://data.seattle.gov</u>, which is part of Seattle's municipal web site. The new site holds significant amounts of information about operations and infrastructure, such as locations of city facilities, schools, and food banks.

<u>Data.seattle.gov</u> is a first step in making data publicly available to meet the city of Seattle's goals for an open, transparent and accountable government. The site initially posts datasets from <u>My</u> <u>Neighborhood Map</u>, which is a feature on the city's website, <u>www.seattle.gov</u>. It will add data managed by city departments, beginning with data which is commonly requested through the public disclosure process. Some of this data is already available on department websites, but <u>data.seattle.gov</u> will centralize the information on a single site.

The **REGIONAL PUBLIC INFORMATION NETWORK** (RPIN) is your one-stop resource for news alerts from more than 75 government, transportation, utility, health and emergency response agencies serving citizens in King, Pierce and Snohomish counties.

RPIN keeps the public informed about street and highway closures, weather, major transit disruptions, and provides updates on what agencies are doing to respond to emergencies and incidents.

The public also can sign up to receive e-mail alerts and pager headlines from RPIN partners and get helpful tips to prepare for emergencies.
